Community Corrections supervision since July 2010 (MEMS/SCRAM NOT included) total 168,563 days (ending October 31, 2023). It would have cost \$6,321,112.50 to incarcerate those offenders in the County Jail, and \$9,095,659.48 at the DOC. This does not include medical costs.
